School age

Your school SENCO will be key to a successful placement. You can ask them about additional support such as an Education Health and Care Plan

2-4 Years

Seek advice from your child's pre school Special Educational Needs Co-ordinator (SENCO). You can also contact the Councils Special Educational Needs (SEN) Team or Information Advice and Support Service as a good source of information

18-24 months

Your child will have a series of assessments that may raise some concerns. Don't forget to ask your Health Visitor and GP for support

Pre-natal and Birth

During your pregnancy and shortly after your birth your Midwife will be you point of contact. They form part of the Starting Well Team.

0-6 months



Your midwife and GP will signpost to Health visitor and hospital consultants e.g. paediatrician

6 months +



Ask your Health Visitor about Charities that can support you in accessing benefits e.g. Disability Living Allowance (DLA) and support Groups such as Parent Carer Forum

6-12 months

Ask your Health Visitor or GP about referrals to other services such as Speech and Language, Children Centre's and Occupational Therapy

6-18 months

Don't forget to ask for support from Charities and other parents such as the <u>Parent Carer Forum</u>. Read a <u>Parents Experience</u> within the Early Years and support you can find in the Local Offer.

Talk to your child's setting or Children's Centre about Education funding such as action for inclusion


The 0-19 Starting Well Service

The Starting Well Service includes early years services (0-5), health visiting, family nurse partnership and 5-19 health and wellbeing services including Children's Centre's.

Starting Well teams include health visitors, nursery workers, early years workers and public health nurses. Our children's centres provide lots of advice and support for families, including 2 year funding and parenting support. Our core purpose is to help in:

- Child development and school readiness
- Parenting aspirations and parenting skills
- Child and family health and life chances

Who are Health Visitors?

<u>Health Visitors</u> are specialist public health practitioners who have expertise in child development and family health. All children until 5 years of age have a Health Visitor.

What is the Family Nurse Partnership?

<u>Family Nurse Partnership</u> (FNP) is a free and voluntary programme for young parents expecting their first baby.

What is a Children's Centre?

Children's centres provide a wide range of services for prospective parents, children and their families below are some examples of what they offer:

<u>Let's Play</u> - is a structured group ran by our early years workers.
 These are free sessions for babies and young children under the age of five and their families.

Sessions are delivered during school term for all children aged 0 to 5 in all main Starting Well Children's Centres.

 <u>Little Readers</u> - are free sessions run once a month by our Early Years Workers in various locations throughout Cheshire West and Chester. Sessions are for babies and young children under the age of five. Sensory Room - Five of our children's centres provide hourly bookings in their sensory room. The sensory rooms are equipped with soft play, offering a calming and soothing space for babies and toddlers alike to explore and interact with their environment through light and sound. Families registered at one of our children's centres can book the sensory room for free.

- has difficulties walking or needs much more looking after than a child of the same age who does not have a disability

Speech and Language

The Central Cheshire Integrated Care Partnership (CCICP) Children and Young People Speech and Language Service aims to provide high quality specialist assessment and evidenced based interventions for children and young people with a range of speech, language and communication difficulties and/or dysphagia (swallowing). Occupational Therapy

The Community Children's Occupational Therapy team sees children and young people who live in the Chester and Ellesmere Port area and have difficulty joining in with the activities they need and want to do every day. We call these activities 'occupations.'

Occupations can include:

- Self-care tasks (e.g. dressing, bathing, using cutlery)
- Education (e.g. handwriting, scissor skills, organising work)
- Play and leisure (e.g. hobbies and sports)

CCICP Paediatric Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy Paediatric Physiotherapy and Occupational Therapy Services provide targeted and specialist intervention for babies, children and young people from birth to 16 years of age (18 years of age for those with complex needs) and live in Northwich, Winsford and surrounding areas. Children's Centres Our children's centres are part of Cheshire and Wirral Partnership NHS Foundation Trust's (CWP) Starting Well service for 0-19 year olds. The Disability Access Fund (DAF) is money that childcare providers can use to support children with disabilities or special educational needs. If your child receives Disability Living Allowance (DLA) your child's childcare provider is eligible to receive Disability Access Funding (DAF), which is £615 per child per year. 

- 2 year old funding, 15 hours free childcare for 3 and 4 year olds and other funding and help paying for childcare can be found here. **Note relating to 2 year old funding:** Special Educational Needs and Disability Inclusion Funding is provided to support children to access their funded early education entitlement therefore it is only provided for eligible children accessing their funded childcare place.

Development/Integrated Review (age 2-3)

Starting Well invite all children and their parents to a Development Review around their second birthday. Children attending a childcare setting will have another 'progress check' between the age of 2 and 3 years completed by the Nursery/Pre-School/Childminder. Any advice, support, or actions should be well communicated between parents, Starting Well and the childcare provider, this is often done by sharing documents using secure email / post. Some children may be offered an 'Integrated review' where everyone comes together in one appointment to review a child's progress and next steps - often these joined up meetings help where children's needs are additional to or different from their peers.

Applying for a school place

Cheshire West and Chester Council has a priority to increase the percentage of learners with an Education Health and Care Plan to access mainstream provision. To do this we are looking at working with our schools and colleges in developing a range of provisions to support young people in accessing education in their locality.

Special Education Needs Co-ordinator (SENCO) is a teacher who is responsible for special educational needs at school. All schools have a SENCO. SENCOs work with other teachers and parents to make sure that children with special educational needs get the right support and help they need at school.

Child and Educational Psychologists (CEPs) are applied psychologists working with children and young people, their families, schools/settings and other professionals. We provide advice on children and young people's learning, social, emotional, behavioural and developmental needs. For details about Child and Educational Psychology Service click here.

SEN Support

Where a child or young person may have Special Educational Needs and/or Disability (SEND) a nursery, school or college should take action to remove any barriers to learning and put support in place. This is known as **SEN Support**.

Top up Funding

Primary and secondary schools within Cheshire West and Chester Council may apply for top-up funding or what is also known as element 3 high needs funding for children and young people who are residents within the borough.

Education, Health and Care Assessment and Plans

An Education, Health and Care ("EHC") needs assessment is an assessment

of the education, health care and social care needs of the child or young person and is commissioned by the Council's SEN Team. The outcome of the assessment may or may not result in an Education, Health and Care Plan.

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Parent Experience







I was told my daughter was delayed at her 2 year development check and would be referred to a paediatrician.

A few months later our appointment day arrived, my daughter was seen and observed, and I was told my daughter may have autism and possible learning disability. I was told to contact my health visitor, I was given information about Disability Living Allowance and also discussed my daughter starting with an early years provider and being supported by Speech and Language Therapy.

This was all a shock and very new to me. I contacted my Health visitor and got support to apply for Disability Living Allowance. My child started at a nursery and was supported by early years specialists and the nurse on the health visiting team, this became our support network.

I was directed to a specialist school for their stay and play sessions and made contact, this took a lot for me to go to but once I walked through the door and got to meet other parents in a similar situation and school support staff this gave me the encouragement I needed and stopped us as a family feeling isolated.

At nursery we had support put in place and my daughter was visited by Speech and Language Therapist and specialist school outreach team.

My daughter was diagnosed with Autism and we applied for an Education, Health and Care Plan. We looked at schools available and options that would best support my daughter's needs.

"For any parent the start of the journey can be very isolating and you wonder how you will manage, my advice is go out there and join anything available to you and your child's needs this will help you understand and get a support network behind you, you are not alone ""
