

A Special Education Needs (SEN) Information Report provides details of the support and provision that is available to children and young people with special educational needs and disabilities.

All Schools must publish information about the available support for children and young people on their schools website .

What funding is available at school? What is SEN Support and Top Up Funding?

School Budget / Element 1

 This is the sum of money for every individual child or young person on role at a school.

SEN Support / Element 2

- Notional SEN budget the money already available to settings to meet the needs of individual pupils with SEND up to a nationally prescribed limit.
- This is currently £6,000.

SEN Support and Top Up Funding / Element 3

 Top up funding. This is funding from the local authority where a child or young person has significant and complex needs. Settings will continue to support children and young person from elements 1 and 2.

Educational Health and Care Plans?







What is an Educational Health and Care Assessment and how do I apply?

An Education, Health and Care (EHC) Needs Assessment is an assessment of the education, health and social care needs of the child or young person. The outcome of the assessment may or may not result in an Education, Health and Care Plan.

What is an Education, Health and Care Plan?

An Education, Health and Care Plan, often referred to as an EHCP, are for children and young people up to the age of 25 who have a special educational need or disability that cannot be met by the support that is available at their school or college.

It describes a child or young person's special educational needs (SEN) and the help they will get to meet them. An EHCP also includes any health and care provision that is needed. It is a legal document written by the Council based upon the information gathered during the EHC Needs Assessment. Annual Reviews

Cheshire West and Chester Council must review an Education, Health and Care Plan annually. The phrase "Annual Review" refers to the whole process, rather than just the review meeting. The first review will take place within a year of an Education, Health and Care Plan being issued and will continue on an annual basis thereafter. For more information click here.

What is a Personal Education Budget?

A Personal Budget is an amount of money identified by the local authority to deliver provision set out in an EHC plan where the parent or young person is involved in securing that provision. To find out more click here.

Education Access Team

The Education Access Team fulfils the Local Authority's (LA), statutory and strategic responsibilities to provide education for vulnerable pupils of compulsory school age by co-ordinating educational provisions and services for pupils who:

- Have been permanently excluded from school.
- Who cannot access school due to medical conditions.
- Who are being admitted to a new school under the Local Authority In Year Fair Access Protocol.
- Are at risk of being permanently excluded.

Resolving Disagreements, Mediation and Tribunal







What is the appeals process?

When a parent or young person is informed of a decision, they are also provided with details of how to start the appeals process. The appeals window is open for two months from this date or one month from the date of a certificate which has been issued following mediation, whichever is the later. The appeals process includes both mediation and the SEND Tribunal.

Mediation

Mediation is required to be considered prior to referring a matter to tribunal. It is an opportunity for all parties to discuss areas of disagreement and look for a resolution.

Tribunal

SEND Tribunal, which is also referred to as First-tier Tribunal, is responsible for handling appeals against local authority decisions regarding special educational needs and disability.

Parents and young people who wish to make an appeal to the Tribunal may do so only after they have contacted a mediation adviser and discussed whether mediation is a suitable way of resolving the disagreement (unless a Section I disagreement). Parents' and young people's right to appeal to tribunal is not affected by entering into mediation.



If your issue or disagreement is not covered by the appeals process, you may wish to submit a complaint. Please follow the link to Cheshire West and Chester's complaint procedures - Corporate comments, compliments or complaints

The complaints process cannot address matters which should be addressed via appeals process.

Disagreement Resolution

If your issue or disagreement is not covered by the appeals process, you may wish to consider Disagreement Resolution. This applies to any aspect of special educational needs and disability (SEND) regardless of whether or not the child or young person is being assessed for or has an Education, Health and Care Plan and can be used at any time with the agreement of the parties involved.

What is a Social Care Assessment?

Families with a child/children who have special educational needs and disabilities (SEND) are entitled to request an assessment of their child's needs.

You can contact the <u>Integrated Access</u> and <u>Referral Team (i-art)</u> who will listen to you and signpost you to the best professional who can complete and assessment for your family.

Transferring to Secondary School for children with an EHCP







The Council appreciates that your child's move to secondary school education can be an exceptionally anxious time. Most children and young people with Education, Health and Care Plans attend and have their needs met within their local mainstream secondary school. For a small number of children, specialist provision may be required.

Secondary Transfer Booklet

The booklet tells you about the type of secondary education that is available in Cheshire West and Chester, and about how you go about expressing your preference for individual schools. For more information click here.



When does the secondary transfer process start?

The secondary transfer process begins when your child is in year 4. It is advisable at this point that parents begin the process of considering which school you would like your child to attend when they transfer to secondary education. We recommend that you go to open evenings at your local secondary schools and use the Cheshire West and Chester Local Offer to explore the range of provision that is available. This will help you make an informed preference about where you feel may be the most suitable setting for your child. It will also prepare you for the discussion that will take place during the year 5 transfer review, that is held for every child with an Education, Health and Care Plan in the Spring term of year 5.

During the Year 5 transfer review, your child's Education, Health and Care Plan will be reviewed and a discussion will be held regarding where you would like your child to go for their secondary education. Your child's current school will run this review and it may be necessary for professionals from health and social care that are involved with your child to also attend. A member of Cheshire West and Chester's SEN team may also attend the meeting to answer any questions that you may have. For mor information click here.

Out of School Clubs

Parent Experience







I adopted two children who had additional needs, had been through significant, prolonged trauma and chronic neglect.

One of my children had not attended school by the age of four and a half, I was encouraged to register with the local school as soon as possible. I had no support or advice about education or knowledge about school options. I did not know what Special Educational Needs (SEN) meant and had no idea about additional funding for extra support and assumed any support would automatically be provided.

After 2 years of struggling, I was told by another parent about the Information Advice and Support Service. The Information, advice, and support service gave me advice and signposted me to the information within the Local Offer.

I asked for support from school and applied for an Education, Health and Care Needs Assessment as a parental request. I asked for advice about preparing for mediation/tribunal. My child now has an Education Heath and Care Plan.

When considering High School options, I had a network of professionals who all gave me great advice and support. I felt empowered and able to make informed choices. Without the additional support, the transition and mainstream setting would have been difficult and potentially failed.
